Here are some of the shocking facts about child hunger in Washington state from the Children's Alliance:

- About half the children born in Washington are in lowincome households.
- Many poor parents skip meals so their kids can eat.
- Think food stamps are the solution? 40% of the people who qualify for food stamps don't get them.
- 400,000 kids get their food from food banks.
- Ever get cranky when you're hungry? Hungry kids are more likely to act out and behave aggressively.
- New stadiums or food for kids? You could fill Safeco Field **five times** with all the Washington kids who live below the poverty level. That's more than the populations of Yakima, Bellingham, and Wenatchee combined.

Broadview workers celebrate unionizing

Vorkers at Broadview Shelter gained the right to Union recognition in March. The group of 44 will join nearly 200 other Local 8 Union sisters and brothers at Solid Ground (formerly Fremont Public Association).

Under the current Solid Ground contract, the agency gives voluntary recognition of the union if the majority of the workers in a program sign authorization cards. Broadview workers had thought about organizing in the past, but this time they were serious. They formed an organizing committee and did the outreach necessary to gain enough support.

"We decided if we joined the other Union workers at Solid Ground, we would gain real protection in the workplace and feel more comfortable about speaking out," stated Symone Edwards, a Child Advocate at Broadview for 61/2 years. The Broadview Organizing Committee, Symone Edwards, Sara Robbins, Katie Showalter, Antonio Medina, and Diane Hughes appreciated the support of Solid Ground Shop Steward Kellie Port and bargaining team member Eileen Bidwell for sharing their experiences as Local 8 activists.



The Freeze is Over

A fter coming off a three year wage freeze, Local 8 Amembers at Lathing, Acoustical and Drywall Systems Local No. 1144 have unanimously ratified a three year agreement with a 4% wage increase and protected medical benefits each year of the Agreement.

Our Local 8 Advocates Win in Olympia

Throughout this year's three-month L legislative session, 50 Local 8 home care workers visited nearly 100 legislators. Our message this year had two purposes. First, we asked support for better compensation for our members whose work allows the frail elderly to remain in their own homes. Second, we worked with home care employers for better funding to protect agencies who otherwise would be in danger of shutting their doors.

The final state budget included funding for both issues. Local 8's home care workers have become expert advocates in Olympia and should be proud of this year's victories.
